

District 14-E will be having a Book Drive for Pediatric Cancer patients at Hershey Medical Center in time for Christmas!



Dear Fellow Lions,

Your donations to Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) are helping to "Change the World." By the end of the first quarter of this Lions' year, 14-E raised a total of \$4,456, which is a \$703.75 increase over the same period last year. This is 23.5% of our annual goal of \$18,954. Since most clubs donate to LCIF during the final quarter of the fiscal year, we are close to being on target to achieving our goal.

By donating to Lions Clubs International's Disaster Relief Fund, you are helping to ensure that families who are coping with major disasters get the help they need, because your funds enable us to respond quickly during these difficult times.

Likewise, Lions Quest is educating more than 16 million youth in 100 countries around the globe to help students develop positive attitudes and respect and to provide information for them to make better choices and to stay off drugs. While many school district don't seem to have time in their busy day, Lions Quest is being applied in after school programs and private schools. Can you think of an area that could benefit from this program?

In addition, the Choose Kindness Project, in collaboration with Lions Quest, is expanding the antibullying resources to help children feel safe. After all, 33% of teens report being bullied, particularly on social media, causing 20% of them to skip school. Furthermore, 66% of students fear violence at school and in their community. So, this program is greatly needed to help create kinder communities, and it is being utilized in such places as Milwaukee and Louisiana.

Finally, have you purchased your square? At this point, our district has sold 47 LCIF squares. When all 100 squares are sold, one lucky Lion will become a Melvin Jones Fellowship, or progress to a new level of recognition. Remember, "You have to play to win."

Your donations, whether it's \$5, \$10, or more, are being used to "Change the World." Thank you for making a difference because EVERY dollar goes to help those in need.

# Q: What does Council Chair Dr. Linda Zaneski want us to find as Lions?


A: Passion. She encouraged new Lions to find what makes them passionate to be Lions but also that people who have been Lions for years need to find new ways to regain that passion.

Benefits of volunteering: Volunteering is good for your mind and body.


Volunteering provides many benefits to both mental and physical health.

Working with pets and other animals has also been shown to improve mood and reduce stress and anxiety.


• Volunteering helps you stay physically healthy.

Volunteering is good for your health at any age, but it's especially beneficial in older adults. Studies have found that those who volunteer have a lower mortality rate than those who do not, even when considering factors like the health of the participants. Volunteering has also been shown to lessen symptoms of chronic pain or heart disease.



Veterans Day is intended to thank and honor all those who served honorably in the military – living and dead – whether in wartime or peace. In fact, Veterans Day is largely intended to thank living Veterans for their service, to acknowledge that their contributions to our national security are appreciated, and to underscore the fact that all those who served - not only those who died - have sacrificed and done their duty.

CABINET MEETING NOVEMBER 4, 2023 BEACON LODGE REPORT Submitted by: PDG Carol Richardson

The July Board of Directors meeting was held at the Camp on September 23 with both 14-E Director PDG Carol and Board Secretary 2<sup>nd</sup> VDG Lisa in attendance, along with other Board members, both in person and virtually, and Council Chair Dr. Linda Zaneski.

Executive Director Lion Jonathan reported on the 2023 camping season, noting that there was a slight increase in the number of campers from the previous year. PLAD was attended by 100 more Lions than average. Fundraising activities were successful, with the basket raffle, duck race and golf outing raising over \$62,000. However, the Camp continues to operate at a significant deficit and now stands at almost \$300,000 in the red for this fiscal year. Money had to be taken from the investment account to cover the deficit. If this continues, the Camp will become insolvent in two years.

Maintenance Supervisor Jeff reported on projects completed July-September and discussed upcoming projects needed in both the adult and children's camps, as well as the pool and other miscellaneous maintenance.

The Camp celebrated its 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary this year with a gala event in September. PIP Clem Kusiak, as well as two State Representatives, were in attendance. The Representatives issued a citation in celebration of the Camp's anniversary.

The Project New Hope sessions were well attended, providing a camping experience for 17 veterans, 17 spouses and 24 children. We need to promote this activity to our disabled veterans – it's FREE for the veteran and his/her family – and we have had NO veterans from Westmoreland County attend. Please reach out to your local VFW, American Legion, and other veterans' organizations to educate them on this program.

Several fundraising ideas were discussed, and board members were encouraged to promote them within their Districts. Camp donations from our District are not very encouraging: we sponsored 6 campers, donated \$1,010 to the 500 Club, and donated \$2,200 to the golf outing. I don't have District figures on bricks purchased or Carl Shoemaker Fellowships presented.

The playground project has been temporarily put "on hold" because fundraising for this project has not been as expected. The intent was to raise \$250,000 – which hasn't happened. New officers were elected, with all taking office on October 1.

Remember Lions – this is YOUR camp (PA LIONS CAMP BEACON LODGE) and you should support it as much as possible by donating, purchasing a brick for a deserving member, supporting the 500 Club, presenting a Shoemaker Fellowship, visiting and promoting the facility. The 14-E Directors and Liaisons will be happy to visit your club to provide more information about the Camp.



On Thursday, November 5<sup>th</sup>, the Lions Diabetes Board of Allegheny and Westmoreland Counties held their Quarterly Board Meeting at the Firepit Woodfired Grill in Irwin, PA. The Board discussed several topics and are planning many upcoming events!










# **Hearing and Deaf Services**

With the Holiday Season upon us, this can be a hard time for those that are hard of hearing. When the family or large groups are together ones with hearing problems can feel left out or sitting recluse in the middle of the group. If you notice a family member or friend a little off and not hearing you as well as in the past, don't ignore them or think of them as not understanding you, sometimes it's a pride thing, others it's total stubbornness.

Many times, hearing aides are very expensive and not covered by most insurances. This puts them out of reach for people that cannot justify the cost or afford them. I recent years the technology advancements have made packaging much smaller and built in features, such as Bluetooth an option.

The best cost savings factors in recent years have been the over the counter and self-set-up hearing devices. Bring the costs drastically down. People that could not afford the \$2000-\$5000 cost may be better understanding of \$300-\$1000 cost.

So when that family member or friend is having a hard time this holiday season hearing you. They may have some new options that weren't available in the past to help them.



Just last week I was talking to a family friend and she reminded me it has been 3 years since her husband took his life. I couldn't believe that time had gone that fast since the news of his passing. She proceeded to tell me that every year is hard and things don't stop her from wondering why. They had such a good life together, kids, grandkids, a long loving marriage. She told me a story on the phone that he had purchased the first hunting rifle for the oldest grandson and was so proud of that moment. Now this year the next grandson was ready to start hunting and she said she would have to buy that rifle. It's those things that she said that hit her the most. Things he should have been there to do. She will make the best of it and she will continue to live each day as she can for herself, her kids and grandkids. But she said she will never stop wondering why.

We went on to talk about other things that we had going on in our lives and health issues. But my friend is one of the strongest women I know. Suicide hurts the loved ones, family, and friends.


Today we may know someone struggling with mental illness, please talk to them, reach out and get them the help they need. Don't wait till it's too late.


