My Fellow Lions,

Thanks to all who helped in any way), and to end the month with the Banner Passing Ceremony.

One thing I have taken note of is Membership. Membership is down everywhere, and we must work very hard to obtain new members and retain current members. Please, if you

have a service project coming up, ask a friend, neighbor or family member to join in as they are potential members. If you are unsure of what to do, or how to do it, please reach out to me or PDG Lance (Global Membership Team Leader) or PDG Tom Gregg (Global Membership Approach Chair) and we can help provide guidance in order to strengthen your club. I will also be assigning Guiding Lions to specific clubs to assist as well. We really need to work on increasing our numbers—if you lose one, try to replace with two!

To aid with Membership growth, Lions International has a new initiative for us. It is Mission 1.5. The objective of Mission 1.5 is to increase our worldwide membership to 1.5 million by the end of 2027. Please watch for more information on this.

Directories are ready and are being distributed at events and meetings. They will be at the 1st Cabinet Meeting as well. If I miss you and you want one, please ask me for one!

PDG Chuck (Global Leadership Team Lead) has scheduled the Club Officer Training for August 28th from 6-8p at the Hoss's in Greensburg. All Club officers should attend—no matter if you are new to the position or if you have been in the position for a while—there is always an opportunity to learn something new or even provide knowledge to someone else. There will be speakers and the opportunity for you to ask questions and share ideas! You do not have to currently hold an office to attend—you can come to learn about a position you might want to hold in the future. This is also one of the District's goals—in order to meet this goal, I need to have 20% attend the training, so please, if at least 2 officers from each club could attend, the goal would be met!

- 6. Also, keep in mind that September is Pediatric Cancer Awareness Month. Lion Amy from Vandergrift Lions Club shared the following with me. Did you know Aflac will provide Aflac Duck Kits for **FREE**!! You can order them to give to children over the age of 3 who have cancer and are going through treatments. 2. Information Security Tip: Dealing with Automated (robo) calls

If you are receiving more frequent phone spam, robocalls, or marketing texts these days, you are not alone. The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) reports that illegal and spoofed robocalls (voice phishing, or "vishing") and unwanted text messages (SMS-text message phishing, or "smishing") are the agency's top consumer complaints.

Phone scammers (and telemarketers) thwart caller ID by using VOIP (Voice Over Internet Protocol) to hide their identity, location and phone number. Other scams use the name of a trusted entity or local company to improve the chance that someone will answer or call back. Tech support, charitable causes, political campaigns, market research, and even family emergency calls are typical ruses for vishing scams. Other robocalls spoof the actual number being called, resulting in a call that appears to come in from "Me." A recorded robocall asks "Can you hear me ok?" If you answer "yes," a scammer can record this response and use it to show that you gave your consent to something that you did not.

Adding a personal or business phone number to the National Do Not Call Registry only stops legitimate and law-abiding telemarketers and fundraisers from making contact. It does not prevent businesses, political entities, and charities with whom you've had a prior relationship from calling, and it is powerless against scammers with no fear of largely unenforced federal laws.

What should you do?

To protect yourself, the FCC offers advice at their website that can be summed up as "don't answer." If you do answer, don't provide information, or answer any questions. If a suspicious call claims to be from your workplace, bank, or other entity that you know, you can always call back on a number that you know is real, if you have any doubt.



District 14-E will be having a Book Drive for Pediatric Cancer patients at Hershey Medical Center in time for Christmas!



For far too many years, most of us have sat on our hands and watched as our district lost clubs and our clubs lost members, while saying, "something must be done." The time has come when we need to act on that statement. We have communities that have lost their clubs and the services they provided. We have communities that never had a club and therefore, have never benefited from our service. Just as importantly, our remaining clubs are losing membership, and as a result, cannot continue to serve in ways that the community has come to expect and need. Furthermore, Lions International has begun a 4-year mission to reach 1.5 million members worldwide, and we have a goal to be a part of the success of that mission.

Every Lion has an important part to play. Together, we can grow Lions Clubs to extraordinary new heights, serving an untold number of people in need.



Proven process

Our Global Membership Approach is designed to revitalize existing clubs, charter new ones and inspire all Lions through fellowship and exciting service.

- 1. We must strengthen our existing clubs by bringing in new and exciting members.
- 2. We must strengthen our communities by providing relevant community services.

3. We must serve those communities who have never had a Lions Club, or have lost their Club over the years. These goals are not going to happen by themselves. It will take a concerted and concentrated effort by all of our members.

How do we begin?

- 1. We must encourage every club to hold a membership social by the end of October and schedule a second one by the end of March. A small twist is to have a small service project in which the prospective members can participate as they learn about your club and Lions, in general.
- 2. We must consider establishing clubs in communities that need our service. These clubs can either be a full club or a Club Branch that needs only 5 members to begin, and then work to grow into a full club of 20 or more members.
- 3. We need to charter specialty/cyber clubs for those in our communities who have neither the time nor the inclination to be a part of a traditional community-based Lions Club. Here are some ideas for those:

A. Service-only club for those who only want to do service and provide the needed human resources for those clubs who need additional help.

B: Golf Club. This club's members enjoy playing golf and could be used to provide help for the numerous clubs that hold golf outings, including our district's Knights of the Blind Open. C. A Four Diamonds Childhood Cancer Club with Penn State Alumni who participated in

"THON" during their undergraduate studies at Penn State University.

All of these, which is not an exclusive list, could begin as a club branch of 5 members.

Please understand that you will not be alone in this endeavor. I, and the District Membership team, will be at your beck and call. We will provide you with tools and support so that we all may be successful. My goal is to attend as many Zone Meetings as my schedule allows and to visit your club, as requested, to provide help on a local level. Please do not hesitate to contact me with questions and concerns, because I am here to help you.

Mission 1.5 has begun, and we have been challenged to do our part to ensure that the mission succeeds. I accept that challenge.

Dear Lions,

September is fast approaching and that means your club should be planning for Childhood Cancer Awareness Month. We need to bring awareness that in research dollars, only 4% is allocated for Childhood Cancer Research. In other words, for every \$1,000,000 in research funding only \$40,000 goes to helping to find a cure and for better treatments that are child centered. 4 out 5 children diagnosed with some form of cancer will survive into adulthood. A large percentage of them will have long term effects from their treatment and or develop some other form of cancer in their lifetime. Did you know that the first chemotherapy drugs were derived from mustard gas. Yes, the same gas that was used as a weapon during World War 1.

In the coming weeks, Four Diamonds will be sending us ideas for advocacy and education about childhood cancer. We need to get the word out and plan what our clubs will do to help end this scourge for our children. Some ideas to start:

- 1. Hold a fundraiser dedicated to Four Diamonds
- 2. Begin to collect <u>new</u> books for DG Amy's collection to be sent to Lion Ashley Grimm and then on to Four Diamonds.
- 3. Reach out to Penn State Alumni who were a part of "THON" during their years at Penn State. Start a Childhood Cancer Club Branch with them.

As I mentioned earlier, we will be getting materials to help from Four Diamonds and when I have them, I will share with you. Always remember it's "For the Kids". #FTK. Help make it possible that no family ever has to hear the words "Your Child Has Cancer."

Yours in Service PDG Tom Gregg Dear Fellow Lions and Leos,

I just returned from an outstanding training session about OUR Foundation: LCIF. Last year's LCIF goal was \$50 million, with a stretch goal of \$55 million. Well, Lions from around the world exceeded that challenge and collected nearly \$68 million!

Unfortunately, in 14-E, we only had 19 clubs that contributed to LCIF during the past year, for a total of \$12,343.91. Perhaps, it was an oversight. Nevertheless, in recent years, 14-E has received more than \$135,000 in grants.

Because less than 4% of Lions in Constitutional Area I (United States and the Islands of the Caribbean), contribute to our Foundation each year, I would like to challenge each of you to contribute what you can. For example, if you set aside \$.10/day, you would be able to donate \$36.50 this year, but if you set aside \$1/week, that would be \$52. Still, if that is too much, can you contribute at least \$5, at some point throughout the year? Obviously, for those who can afford to donate more, that would be greatly appreciated. Likewise, those Lions who have been recognized as Melvin Jones Fellows should lead by example and be the first to donate.

Remember that 100% of your donations are used to "Change the World" in the areas of vision, youth, disaster relief, humanitarian aid, diabetes, hunger, the environment, and childhood cancer. How much are you willing to donate to change a life?



Dear Lions and Leos,

Although the Global Action Team (GAT) has been around for a few years, some of you may still be wondering what it is. This is a team of Lions, who help the clubs to achieve the district goals by encouraging positive membership growth, increasing community visibility through relevant service projects, and by training successful leaders through guidance, motivation, and mentoring.

The GAT has members at each level: club, district, multiple district (MD-14), and international levels. Each club should elect or appoint a Membership Chairperson who works with the club members to seek potential members who are passionate about improving their community. Likewise, the first vice president serves as the leadership chair, while the club also elects a service chairperson who suggests and encourages new and meaningful service projects, in addition to planning those projects that have stood the test of time.

At our District level, PDG Lance Remic is the Global Membership Team coordinator (GMT). PDG Chuck Thompkins, who, as the Global Leadership Team coordinator (GLT) provides various training opportunities for many offices and positions, while PDG Charlie McGrew serves as the Global Service Team coordinator (GST) to offer new service ideas and assist with district service projects. Finally, PDG Tom Gregg, the GMA Team Lead, will assist clubs with the Global Membership Approach, a successful process to increase and strengthen club and district membership.

At the Multiple District (State) level, PDG Cheryl Wilbur is the Global Membership Team coordinator; PDG Kerry McKnight, who trains the Vice District Governors and organizes the Regional Lions Leadership Institute (RLLI), as well as the Symposiums, is the Global Leadership Team coordinator, and PDG Bob Roebuck is the Global Service Team coordinator who has numerous ideas for service projects.

I, along with PDG Beth Stevens, from Virginia, serve as the Area Global Action Team coordinators for Ohio, Pennsylvania, Virginia, and West Virginia.

As you can see, there are several Lions who can help your clubs. You just need to "ASK!" Please contact any of us to help strengthen your club this year. Without you, 14-E cannot continue to be the Excellent district.

So how do we as a declining District, Multiple District, and Constitutional Area even play part in increasing Membership to 1.5 million if all we have done is played part in decreasing Membership for so long? Simple, New Members must be more than the Members that we Drop!



August Lions Newsletter:

The month of August brings the best bounty of the season, ripened tomatoes, melons, sweet corn on the cob, green peppers, and cucumbers and so much more! What a fun time to experiment with new recipes to fill your plate with color and good nutritious food. I decided last year I would plan to begin my garden with seedlings. I purchased plant growing lights, containers, potting soil, miracle grow and folding tables. I started my seedlings in April in my basement and by May I had a wide garden variety to plant after the threat of frost had passed. This year I took a leap of faith and purchased a portable green house. I added a radiator type heater, and it remained a balmy 70 degrees inside, while frost was still a threat. This made me feel better than Captain Green Jeans and brought back memories of doing something similar in sixth grade. We used egg cartons, planted seeds, and watched them grow. It was flower seeds, but I still remember how thrilled I was, when I took them home and planted them. In a brief time, I watched them grow into beautiful Zinnias. Since this experience remains so vivid in my mind, I expanded my growing experiment and donated healthy plants to the annual green swap and even ventured to grow potatoes, green beans and peas The beauty of this project is the sky is the limit and there is tons of information on the internet for tips and tricks to a fantastic vegetable or flower producing garden. I incorporated raised beds into my regular garden and patio garden this year to provide more growing room and my efforts have paid off in beautiful organic vegetables. I believe in teaching children how to grow and harvest their own food, not only is it fun but teaches life skills for independent living.

This activity may be something you never thought about but is particularly important with the rising cost of buying food to feed your family. I am one of the lucky ones, having had experience as a young child on a farm. I learned how to grow, preserve, and make food from scratch. It has served me well over the years. It is important to pass on critical life skills to children and what better way than involving them in a food growing project. They see it through, from the beginning to the end, what a great reward! In my experience as a teacher, they call this student-centered learning, which studies have shown to be the most effective form of instruction. In addition, this will fight off boredom, get your children unhooked from the electronic leash and teach them skills that will last a lifetime. Involving the entire family will let your children utilize their technology skills, combined with life skills for a memorable event. Even though technology makes it easy to look up "how to do things as well as recipes," it does not replace the memories that tickle your emotions when your senses are involved. I am sure s you remember walking into your grandparents' home and smelling homemade cookies baking in the oven, or warm bread that just came out of the oven. What about eating homemade spaghetti sauce with tomatoes grown in your own garden? I guess in summary, you might say this is a lesson in "Food for Thought"!

In closing, put your computer whiz kids to work researching how to grow, preserve and cook and plan a family project around it. Canning is labor intensive, but freezing is also an option with vacuum seal machines for sustainability. Let the children choose their preferred methods and see how their work may be accomplished as a team.

If you would have told me that I was going to be this way when I was younger I would have never believed it.

If you have the ability to protect your hearing or have it treated at a young age please do. There are many devices on the market to aid you, external devices and internal implants. The technology is moving so quickly in the world today I am sure we will see some great changes coming in the upcoming years. I will be reporting on what I find that is up and coming and available to the market.

BEACON LODGE REPORT

The July Board of Directors meeting was held at the Camp with both 14-E Directors and Liaisons in attendance, along with other Board members, both in person and virtually.

Executive Director Lion Jonathan reported that the 2023 camping season is in full swing and fully staffed!! Staff is having trouble recruiting participants for the Children's Village program. Many new special needs camps have recently opened in PA and parents are sending their children to camps closer to their homes. In order to promote the Camp, media outlets have been contacted and a television station attended PA Lions Appreciation Day (PLAD) and did a spot on local TV. A radio station also had representatives there to do a live spot. PLAD was very well attended, with almost 500 Lions and guests in attendance. The Camp continues to operate at a significant deficit and now stands at \$212,000 in the red for this fiscal year.

The Camp is celebrating its 75th anniversary this year and will be holding an invitation-only gala event in September. Members of the State Senate and Congress, as well as Representatives, have been invited with the hope that they will be impressed with the Camp and renew State funding.

The first session of Project New Hope had 19 veterans and family members attending, utilizing 7 cabins in Children's Village. The second session was held July 29-Aug 2; I haven't received a report on that session yet. We need to promote this activity to our disabled veterans – it's FREE for the veteran and his/her family.

According to the contribution summaries I received, contributions to the 500 Club by 14-E Lions was only \$960 from 7 Clubs. I would like to see 100% participation from our Clubs this year – it's only \$5/member. If you want more information, contact one of the Directors or Liaisons. Also, the golf outing is coming up soon – August 26. You can still sponsor a hole or golf cart, or send a group to golf.






