Fellow Lions,


As committee chairs for the Eye Glass Collection for the District, we are respectfully asking that you please hold all donations at this time.

Regardless of these traditions, celebrating this year will certainly be different. Christmas and holiday parties have been canceled. Instead of “Dashing Through the Snow” to get gifts from the Angel Tree list, our church requested cash or gift cards. For many families, “I’ll Be Home for Christmas” will only be in their dreams because family visits are curtailed. Likewise, those in nursing homes, hospitals, and assisted living facilities will not get a personal visit from loved ones. Although, a few clubs purchased tablets for nursing home residents to help them keep in touch with loved ones.

Level Green participated in “Wreaths Across America.” Many clubs and individuals purchased books for the Children’s Hospital in Hershey for children afflicted with various types of cancer. Other clubs participated in the “Reverse Advent Calendar,” adopted a family, or provided much needed food baskets.

Yes, this has been a challenging time, but Lions are resilient and have been inspired to find new ways to safely serve our communities and to seek donations.

A few clubs throughout Pennsylvania are selling Christmas trees, albeit with a few restrictions; while others are trying “drive through.” One club is selling firewood. (It’s too bad that they aren’t closer!) Another club provided a food trailer for the teachers, while one did it for the frontline workers. Some hunters participated in a Turkey Shoot. Of course, there were some very generous hunters who donated their deer to various Food Banks that are in dire need of assistance at this time. However, another club is looking to the future and planning a competition between remote controlled cars.

While most of us have much for which to be thankful, there are several in our clubs and communities who have lost beloved family members and friends. Please keep them in your thoughts and prayers. Send an ecard to let them know that you care or send one to seniors and shut-ins to cheer them.


Leadership

Service

The need for Service does not stop during the holiday season (or a pandemic). In fact, the need for Service is sometimes even more obvious during these times. What can we do as Lions to help during the holidays? What can we do to Serve as Lions during the holidays that also occur during a pandemic?

Lions from across the Multiple-District just finished up with an opportunity to donate new children's books to the "Remembering Sam" book drive to benefit kids at Penn State's Children's Hospital. This project not only allowed for Clubs to make donations to the drive but also for individual Lions to donate books. While several boxes of books were gathered and sent directly from the District 14-E collection efforts what made this project successful was the opportunity for people to go online and purchase books to be mailed direct. A schoolteacher who knows about Lions through our Lions Lunchables program offered to buy the books with funds collected using her teacher account at Scholastic Books. It was a partnership with all involved – the Clubs and individuals donating to the project, the teacher, the book seller, and Penn State. We are also working on making this teacher a member and with her seeing the good we do with Lunchables, and now this project, we are a little bit closer in making that happen.

There are other projects going on that people can play part in now. The Pennsylvania Lions Adopt a Soldier Project allows items to be collected, packaged, and mailed to service men and women overseas. Just as the books collected serve as pick-me-up for the kids being treated for cancer, these care packages serve to help thank the men and women serving this country in the military by providing them with some of the personal daily comforts we might take for granted.

Clubs continue with special seasonal projects. One that comes to mind is the Pajama Collection that is held during the winter months each year by the Mt. Pleasant Township Lions Club. As the days get shorter and nights longer, we experience the colder temperatures this time of year. The Mt. Pleasant Lions have worked to help keep kids warm by collection and donating warm pajamas that are distributed through the WIC program. If this is something that you would be interested in helping with you can contact a member of the Mt. Pleasant Township Lions Club.


As everyone has been asked to stay home and stay more confined this past several months, it is important to remember those people who are "shut-in" all the time. They rely on family and visitors to provide them the essentials they need including food and just a regular smiling face to check on them (not as easy to see from behind our facemasks but the smiles are still there). While we would normally be celebrating the holidays by getting together and partying, we are being socially responsible and holding back from that this season. In Slickville we decided to do something to bring some joy to our local shut-ins. We are delivering poinsettias to a list of people who are known to be homebound without many daily visitors. Hopefully by spending a few dollars towards each poinsettia it ends up bringing priceless response to someone receiving it.

What have you done with your Pringles can after last year's Pringles Can Challenge? Last November we started a drive to use Pringles chip cans to collect change for Childhood Cancer. That event ended in February but hopefully you kept the can and continue to collect your pocket change. Why not take your change and give it to a cause that means something special to you? You might already collect change and give it to your kid's college fund or to help beef up your grandkids piggy bank, but if you don't already have an outlet for your change, why not find something and make a donation? Of course, the Salvation Army is always a seasonal tradition for collecting your pocket change as you leave a store. As we saw in our collective efforts to collect change last year the small donations really add up.

Finally, do not forget the foodbank this time of year. The Westmoreland Country Food Bank website has details on how to make both food donations as well as small financial donations. They even have a virtual food drive where you can pick the food you would like to purchase with your donation to help fill the delivery basket of a person in need.

Amanda and I would like to wish everyone a Happy Holiday Season. We hope you are safe, healthy, and we hope to see you again in the New Year.

Last year, we had a great response for our efforts with Toys for Tots. The tradition evolves this year with the COVID protocols in place. Consider stepping up and repeating our involvement.

The Toys for Tots program is prepping for 2020. As of today, they will be packing and prepping the toys the week of **DEC 14- 18**. The site will be different, at a site to be determined. We have no idea of the bicycle supply, so we may not be assembling the armada/fleet/convoy of bikes as last year. I agreed to act as the Lions liaison for this event.

Due to Covid protocols, they are planning to operate in the afternoon and the evening. This will reduce the crowd of volunteers in the warehouse area and crowd density. 

> Dave Golder was among the first clients we served after being able to resume our services. Even though traveling to the Leader Dog campus might have posed a risk, Dave was ready to go. “The first class I was scheduled for was cancelled due to COVID, but I knew I wanted to get training the first chance possible. I felt comfortable being on campus because everyone took such great precautions to keep us safe.”

> As a social worker and mother of two, Leatrice Fullerton didn't want to put off getting the help she needed to keep up with her life. “My need for a guide dog was great and I really wanted to do this for myself, but the timing with COVID wasn't good. But, after it was explained to me that there were going to be less people in the building and many safety protocols were put in place, I felt reassured.”

> The events beginning in May 2020 that spurred nationwide protests caused us to pause and further evaluate if we have been actively promoting diversity within Leader Dogs for the Blind. 

Old Skills, New Friends – Making Harnesses for Leader Dogs

After working as an orthotist (a person who makes custom orthopedic devices) for 39 years, my wife and I closed our family business in 2015. Shortly after retiring I started volunteering in the tack room. I was very excited to be part of Leader Dogs for the Blind (LDB) since I grew up nearby and had a family connection.

My daughter worked for several years as a guide dog mobility instructor for English and Spanish-speaking clients. While she worked at LDB, my wife and I had an opportunity to take a tour of the facility. I saw my retirement future as soon as we stepped into the tack shop. This is where the tack shop volunteers assist with assembling and repairing leather harnesses and tie-downs for the dogs. Some of the harnesses are also customized to accommodate a dog or handler's physical stature. When I trained many years ago to become an orthotist, most of the devices were made from leather and metal. Although technology has changed over the years to incorporate more sophisticated materials, I always loved using my old school leather work skills.
