Guest Article - Book Review


Please enjoy this guest article by our very own IPCC and PDG Dave Leon. (Lion Dave was a member of the Murrysville Lions Club and served as District Governor during the 1994-95 Lions Year). He recently shared this on the Global Lions Forum Facebook Group and was gracious enough to grant permission to let us share this with you right here in our newsletter. ENJOY!

Fellow Lions,

A while ago I was introduced to the book: *The New Breed, Understanding and Equipping the 21st Century Volunteer*, by father & son authors, Thomas W. & Jonathan McKee. I have previously read some quotes from it and just recently started reading the book because I am, in fact, wanting to understand how to recruit (and lead!) this younger crop of potential Lions Clubs' members.

McKee notes that there three essential hats a Lion Leader must wear for working with the new breed of volunteers:

- 1. The **Volunteer Recruiter** who understands that the new breed of volunteer is "cause driven"
- 2. The **Volunteer Manager** who understands how to empower this new breed who wants to be "led", not "managed"
- 3. The **Volunteer Leader** who understands how to establish the power and passion of your volunteer team.



I am sure at some point in time you have asked yourself: Where have all the volunteers gone? or Why aren't people as committed as they use to be? or even What's wrong with these young people? Here are some things that might explain the new people dynamics in the 21st century:

- Family dynamics we have gone from "Father Knows Best" to "Two and a Half Men"
 - There are less nuclear families (Working Dad, Stay-at-home Mom, 2.6 kids and a dog) and more single-parent or two-wage earner families. How we lead these people to volunteer must also change.
- Isolation "communities" have turned into "individualism"
 - People's circle of friends and networks have shrunk... by almost 2/3rds! So the places where you will find volunteers is changing. While the number of volunteers coming from churches and civic organizations is dropping, the number of individual volunteers is booming.
- Flexibility Things have gone from "rigid scheduling" to "volunteer availability"
 - One factor that contributes to a greater number of volunteers is a willingness to be flexible. Today's volunteer does not want to sit in boring board meetings, they want you to email them what you want them to do so they can get it done!
- Generations There are less "experienced veterans" and more "novice Millennials"
 - o This is the Texting Generation who is also known for loving what they do and quitting what they hate.
 - o This means that they do love volunteering their skills for the betterment of the community.
- Technology Less "face-to-face" and more "cyberspace"
 - The internet and smartphones can lead us to a new type of volunteer: the virtual volunteer. Facebook, Twitter, YouTube and blogs have provided new tools for interacting and collaboration.
- Professionalism From skilled workers to knowledge workers
 - A Knowledge worker is someone who wants to make decisions. They not only volunteer, but also want to
 influence how the volunteer project should be accomplished. Many volunteers today are professionals and
 want to be treated accordingly.

- Episodic Volunteering "long-term commitments" have moved to "short-term projects"
 - Some volunteer managers have seen that about 75% of their volunteers are episodic, up from 25% 25 years ago. Who are these episodic volunteers? Those who are willing to volunteer, but cannot (or will not) serve as a regular, ongoing volunteer throughout the year.
- Slacktivism The new breed is less likely to "work hard" and prefer easy "feel good" tasks
 - How can a slacker be an activist? These are the people who sign petitions, wear awareness bands, put on assorted color ribbons, takes part in short-term boycotts or makes donations to a cause with the click of a mouse.
- Micro-Volunteering Moving from "big-time commitments" to "bite-sized projects"
 - The summer of 2011 was the point where people shifted from spending more time on their smartphones than on their computers. What do people do when they have extra time between activities (like sitting in the waiting room or standing in line)? What if you could harness some of those minutes (or hours)?
- Speed When it comes to change, it's from "slow movements" to "fast responses"

o How fast are you responding to change? How long does it take you to respond to your volunteers' requests? Are you afraid of change? or, Are you afraid of losing control?

The authors call all these "seismic shifts". They represent the biggest change in volunteering in the 21st century.

Happy Birthday to our founder, Melvin Jones!

Melvin was born on January 13, 1879, at Fort Thomas, Arizona, a remote U.S. Army cavalry post where his father was an Army scout. At the age of 7, the Jones family moved east and settled in Illinois where he eventually formed his own insurance agency in Chicago.

Melvin Jones was a dreamer, a doer, and an energetic, extroverted salesman who loved to read Shakespeare and sing.

In fact, his voice was so beautiful that he considered making music his career. Consequently, his love of singing is one of the traditions that many clubs still continue to follow.



Nevertheless, Melvin chose to become an insurance salesman and formed his own agency in 1913. However, because he believed that "You can't get very far until you start doing something for somebody else, " he decided to refocus the Business Circle where he was a member.

Together with his wife, championship golfer Rose Amanda Freeman, they sent hundreds of letters to various businessmen about about this new "service-centered organization" that he envisioned. Those interested businessmen met in Chicago on June 7, 1917, where the seeds of Lions Clubs International were sowed.

Later that year, at the Lions' inaugural convention in Dallas, Texas, Jones was elected secretary-treasurer, a title he held until the Board of Directors bestowed the title of secretary general for life. Because of his devotion to the organization, in 1926, Melvin gave up his insurance agency to work full time for Lions International until his death on June 1, 1961 at the age of 82. What a wonderful legacy he has left to the world.

How will you honor our founder's birthday? This year, Lions International has devoted an entire week to provide service in honor of Melvin Jones. Of course, since all of the LCIF squares were sold, DG Amy will be picking one lucky number to recognize 14-E's latest Melvin Jones Fellow. Will it be you? If you didn't purchase a square, you can still donate to Lions Clubs International Foundation. Every dollar helps. Just give me a call.

Thanks for all that you do to further Melvin Jones' legacy by "Changing your community and the World."




REBIRTH

- Prepare healthy meals for families with children undergoing treatment. This can be done in collaboration with other community members to ensure the family receives food on a regular basis.
- Collect recyclable materials and donate the profits to a childhood cancer organization.
- Write cards full of well-wishes and share them with a local cancer center.
- Donate financial support or gift cards to identified families in need or a nearby childhood cancer center. This could cover expenses like gasoline, parking, food, medical expenses, etc.
- Make or buy new hats, caps, head scarves or blankets to donate to childhood cancer centers.
- Volunteer at a local childhood cancer organization fundraising event.
- Organize a community drive to assemble a toy library for the enjoyment of patients.
- Participate in a blood donation or bone marrow registry event to benefit cancer treatment.

ACT // INTERMEDIATE

- Collaborate with an organization that makes wigs for children with cancer to collect and donate hair.
- Provide tutoring services to children with cancer, their siblings, or adult learning opportunities for parents.
- Organize an event with a cancer support center to have family photographs taken.
- Raise awareness of childhood cancer through informational pamphlet distribution, radio public service announcements, or social media campaigns.
- Provide children's entertainment at a local hospital or treatment center for children with cancer. Entertainment can include social visits to read books and play games, hosting a seasonal party, or spending time with siblings of patients.
- Provide funding support for essential medicines and supportive services. Crucial medical needs could include chemotherapy supplies, nutritional supplements, medical equipment, essential staff, etc.
- Participate in a one-time volunteer activity at a childhood cancer camp.
- Organize a community childhood cancer awareness event such as a walk/run event or pamphlet distribution.

ACT // ADVANCED

- Familiarize yourself with the bone marrow transplant registry. If one is not established in your country, determine what would be needed to create one.
- Organize an advocacy event to impact government policy around childhood cancer.
- Acquire and equip vehicles for the transportation of patients and family members for commuting to and from the hospital.
- Volunteer at established support housing facilities or develop a new one.
- Make yarn character wigs (ex. Superhero, princess) for children with cancer.
- Organize a workshop with medical specialists in child oncology for pediatric physicians, nurses, related medical personnel, or parents to train on early diagnosis of childhood cancer.
- Organize a fun half-day retreat for families of children in remission or the siblings of children with cancer.
- Furnish waiting rooms for the families and quests of children with cancer.
- Organize and facilitate an activity at a childhood cancer camp.
- Create mini-kitchens at hospitals or support homes for food preparation and supply with food.
- Organize a fundraiser for a childhood cancer organization, or for a local family who has been impacted by childhood cancer.



UPDATE


The District 14 E Lions served another Christmas as Santa's helpers in their annual Bike a Palooza.






